Well, what a turnout we had last month for our first post Covid meeting!


It just goes to show you how people feel the need to socialise. We are certainly not meant to operate in isolation for long periods of time, however enjoyable those couple of months were.

These are the Political Alerts that have come across my next this month that may be of interest.

MCGOWAN GOVERNMENT INVESTS \$36 MILLION FOR ELECTIVE SURGERY BLITZ (WA)

The McGowan Government will invest \$36 million towards an elective surgery blitz following the impacts of the pandemic. The significant boost will enable approximately 5,800 more elective procedures to be conducted by the end of this year than was projected prior to COVID-19. Western Australian

health service providers will use a number of strategies to clear the elective surgery waitlists - extending the hours of operation in theatres to accommodate the extra patients on twilight and potentially weekend surgery lists, increasing hours of work available to existing staff, and using additional staff if required.

AUSTRALIA'S COVIDSAFE APP AMONG SAFEST IN THE WORLD (FED)

Australia's COVIDSafe tracing app is one of the best and safest apps of its kind in the world, according to University of Adelaide cybersecurity experts who have been exploring the vulnerabilities of people-tracing apps. A team from the University of Adelaide's School of Computer Science has made the claim after assessing 34 of the world's COVID-19 contact tracing apps for security and privacy vulnerabilities. The team studied Android device tracing apps that have had more than 10,000 downloads each in different countries, as well as apps recommended by official authorities.

WHAT ABOUT DOWNSIZING OR RIGHTSIZING? From National Seniors Australia

The following is a letter to the editor in a recent copy of the West Australian Newspaper: I read with concern reports of all the grants being given to new-home builders. Has anyone considered the pensioners who are thinking of downsizing? Our superannuation has taken a severe hit with recent events, the share market is depressed, and banks are paying no interest or next to none. If we downsize, we are hit with stamp duty if we build or purchase a new home. Can some consideration be given to helping the plight of pensioners who are downsizing? I never received a first homeowner's grant and have never received help of any kind from the Government apart from my pension. If pensioners have never

been given any grants before, then these grants should apply to them also, and if the burden of stamp duty was lifted on downsizers, that would be of great help! Food for thought and we know NSA is advocating to this end for us.

The following has been written by the late Douglas Adams of "Hitchhiker's Guide to the Galaxy"

(Many of you will know this book, so I hope you enjoy this little read)

An Englishman's View of Australia!

- "Australia is a very confusing place, taking up a large amount of the bottom half of the planet. It is recognisable from orbit because of many unusual features, including what at first looks like an enormous bite taken out of its southern edge; a wall of sheer cliffs which plunge into the girting sea. HILLARYS AND DISTRICT BRANCH OF NATIONAL SENIORS AUSTRALIA OVER THE YEARS

In early 2004, members of National Seniors who lived in Hillarys and surrounding suburbs were invited to attend a meeting at the Hillarys Yacht Club. The purpose of the meeting was to ascertain whether there was support for establishing a new branch. There was a good attendance at this meeting (70 to 80 people) and a number of those attending indicated they were prepared to assist in the establishment of not one but two branches. It was proposed that one would be a day branch, the other an evening one.

A formation meeting for the day branch was then held at the Whitfords Tavern in March 2004. In attendance were State Branch Development Officer Rosemary Charsley, along with David Haimes, Glen Moore and Hazel Norris. Despite the small number attendance, it was decided to proceed with the formation of a new branch of National Seniors that would meet during mornings. The branch was to be called Hillarys and District Branch. Glen Moore and David Haimes agreed to nominate as President and Secretary, respectively, of the new branch. Subject to a suitable venue being found, meetings were to be held on the first Wednesday of the month.

Subsequently, Rosemary Charsley was able to secure the Flinders Park Community Hall on Broadbeach Blvd Hillarys as the meeting place. The inaugural meeting was held on Wednesday 7th April 2004. There were 14 people in attendance at this meeting and from these a committee of nine was formed.

The Branch was incorporated on 2nd September 2004.

Meanwhile, an evening branch to cater for people still in the workforce and known as Hillarys Sunset was also formed. Initially, it held its meetings at Hillarys Yacht Club, where members were able to partake of a meal. The evening branch has gone through changes of name and meeting venue over the years and is now known as Northern Districts Sunset.

Our branch was slow to grow at first but eventually we were to see 30 or 40 or more members attending our meetings. That the branch has been able to continue for more than 16 years is due to it always having a group of people willing to take on leadership roles. Sadly, many of the branches that around when ours were was established no longer function. The reason? No one was prepared to fill the leadership roles.

A highlight of our time as a branch was when we hosted the 2010 Zone Conference at Hillarys Yacht Club. It proved to be a very successful day and our membership grew as a result.

Another highlight was in 2016 when we celebrated our 12th anniversary at our April meeting. It coincided with the 40th anniversary of National Seniors Australia. Prior to the meeting, we arranged for Head Office to send out an invitation to members of National Seniors who lived within our area. We also engaged the services of Alan Mannings from Curtin Radio, who gave a nostalgic presentation of video and music from our younger years. Some 57 people attended our meeting, including at least a dozen who had never been to our branch before. This stands as the record attendance at one of our meetings.

With the branch presently in the hands of excellent leadership, I am confident it will continue for many years to come.
