#### MEMBER PROFILE - BRIAN OLD

I was born and raised in Northampton England. On completing my school years at Northampton Grammar School my working life commenced with a 5 year apprenticeship as a Quantity Surveyor.

At the end of this period I was called to do 2 years National Service with the Army. This had been deferred for a couple of years because of my apprenticeship.

Following this I returned to work with the same building company and a month later Valerie and I were married. Soon after that the company transferred me to their Wiltshire Office.

A few months later I obtained work with a London company and went out to Nairobi Kenya where they had a contract to build g large complex for the British Army. This was a self-contained town/small city consisting of houses, shops, schools, church, parks etc. Soon after this work was completed the country obtained independence and the whole project was handed over to the Kenya Government.

We then moved to Tanganyika where I was employed by a Dar-es-Salaam company to manage their Mwanza office. Mwanza, on the shores of Lake Victoria 1146 k from the capital is a small township – or it was then. The projects I dealt with were mainly road and bridge building Bailey Bridges.

Every rainy season the storms were so severe that just about every bridge was swept away and the whole process started again. Because of the nature of the terrain we were never able to fully solve the problem.

After about 10 years in Africa we returned to England when our daughter was 9 months old. There I worked in the Architects Dept of the Greater London Council. Part of my work involved the restoration/preservation of historical buildings.

After 10 years in England we applied to emigrate to New Zealand. This happened to be the year they had stopped assisted passages etc so it proved to be an expensive and long process before we were approved a year later.

On arrived in New Zealand we lived in Hamilton and then Rotorua, the thermal area, where I was Property Manager for the Ministry of Education covering the Bay of Plenty area.

Two years after a heart attack I took early retirement and a couple of years after that we sold up and moved to Brisbane.

#### **MEMBER PROFILE - VALERIE OLD**

I was born in Northampton England, spent my school years there and started my working life there.

When I was 15 I met Brian, now my husband, at the local Youth Club and we got engaged when I was 17. Following Brian's return from 2 years National service we were married 4 days after my 21st birthday.

Not long after this we moved to Swindon, Wiltshire for Brian's work and I was employed by the same company.

The following year Brian obtained work with a London company and started a new life working in Nairobi, Kenya, East Africa. I joined him 3 months later. There I worked for a company that supplied equipment to the Williamson Diamond Mine. Unfortunately no samples from the mine.

We then moved to Mwanza, Tanganyika, a small township on the shores of Lake Victoria, again for Brian's work. We had 1 train service a week, a 3 day journey to the capital, Dar-es-Salaam. I ferry service a week,  $2\frac{1}{2}$  days from Kisumu, Kenya, and 1 or 2 small aircraft a week. In addition to passengers all of these, hopefully, brought in supplies.

It was a cotton growing area, all hand picked by the local African women. I was employed by the Cotton, Lint & Seed Marketing Board. One of the few employment opportunities there for European women.

The United Nations also had an office there with a small task force. It was a potential plague area so the situation was constantly monitored.

As Tanganyika was a British Colony the police force hierarchy were all British, the constables being from the local African population. As Mwanza was a small police force they employed Special Police Constable volunteers from within the European community. As it turned out only 2 people volunteered – myself and another lady. I was employed for evening and weekend work. For this I received the princely sum of Shilllingi Moja – 1 African Shilling a week. The police work was in addition to my day time job. My duties would be to man the radio with the occasional trip out to the outlying islands in the police launch – a little wooden boat. It was during my time with the police that I learnt to drive and shoot..

I believe Mwanza has changed a great deal over the years the location attracting foreign investment. During our time in Tanganyika the country obtained independence and the name was changed to Tanzania, a combination of Tanganyika and Zanzibar.

Our daughter was born there and we returned to live in England when she was 9 months old. And so ended about 10 years of a quite different life.

After 10 years of English village life, living in a 600 year old cottage, we again packed our bags and headed to New Zealand where we lived in the North Island for almost 25 years.

We arrived in Brisbane, September 2000. We hoped to be a support for our daughter whose first child was born with health problems. She came to Brisbane when she was 17 and will be 54 this year.

Brian and I are 86 and 84 this year, married for 63 years, so Brisbane is where we will end our days, while enjoying being National Seniors members.
