PROFILE - NOELA WEBB

As I have lived in South East Queensland all of my life I don't think my story is quite as exciting as some. I was born in Brisbane and lived in Ashgrove. I remember Ice chests, wood stoves and coppers and toilets in the back yard, but after World War 2 ended we changed over to gas and toilets inside eventually. We had an air raid shelter in our back yard, and chooks of course. We crossed Ithaca creek at the end of our street to get our milk from a hook on the back fence of Gramenz's Dairy, we also caught eels in the creek. Men used to come around selling wooden props for our clothes lines before Hills hoists. Our car was a pre-war Dodge, until the FJ Holden arrived. We travelled mainly by tram.

Gilbert Park, where the Broncos are now, was over the creek from where I lived, and there was a Circus in the park every year for quite a while, and a Chinese Garden in the area, where we used to buy vegetables which were not in our garden.

I turned 5 a few months after the war started so was at school throughout the war. At some time during this time our school closed, and my twin sister and I went to school at Yangan, near Warwick, for about 6 months. We had air raid trenches in the front yard of the school in Brisbane, and I remember the ground being very hard when we had to practice getting into them.

I left school at 15 and worked in a Government Department and then at the Commonwealth Bank next to the G.P.O. which was later demolished and Macarthur House built. In 1956 I attended the Olympic Games in Melbourne, which was very exciting, and was married in 1958. My husband was a teacher, also from Brisbane, and we moved to Proston. This was a small town, only three teachers at the school, and everyone was very welcoming. We were transferred to Brigooda, a one teacher school two weeks before our first child, a son, was born. There was no electricity. All the farms, most 250 acre, had generators. They grew peanuts and some dairying. We did not have a generator, but we soon adjusted to the different way of lighting ,kerosene refrigerator etc. After four years we went to Gowrie Junction, not far out of Toowoomba. We had two daughters while we were there. Hockey was very popular in the Toowoomba area, and I remember our son Mark represented Toowoomba in the under 10's, when he was only 6. Our next move was to Stanthorpe where we stayed for 30 years.

We had another son in Stanthorpe and the family grew up involved in lots of sports and Guides and Scouts. My husband with coaching the boys sports mainly. I was involved in Guiding for about 20 years as a Brownie and Ranger Guide leader and District Commissioner, I also joined the QCWA in 1986, and have since visited most of the Capital cities and Canberra for conferences etc, World Conferences in India, Christchurch and Melbourne, and South Pacific area in Tonga. I have been lucky enough to have been overseas to parts of Europe and the British Isles and Cambodia, but still think Australia has great places to visit. I have been living back in Brisbane for 21 years, and enjoyed visiting family in Victoria and New South Wales, as well as Queensland, and hope we will be able to do so again in the not too long future

It is with great sadness that I have to mention the loss of a few local businesses as a result of COVID-19. A local bra manufacturer has gone bust, a submarine company has gone under, a manufacturer of food blenders has gone into liquidation, a dog kennel has had to call in the retrievers and a company supplying paper for origami enthusiasts has folded. The local strip club has gone tits up, Interflora is pruning its business and Dyno-rod has gone down the drain. The saddest one though is the ice cream van man found dead covered in nuts and raspberry sauce. He couldn't take it anymore and topped himself.

RECIPE:

GERMAN APPLE CAKE (Courtesy Brenda Bennett)

2 eggs

1 cup vegetable oil

2 cups castor sugar

2 teas. ground cinnamon

½ teas. salt

1 teas vanilla essence

2 cups plain flour

1 teas baking powder

4 cups apples – peeled, cored and diced – or use Apple Pie Filling

Preheat oven to 175 deg. Grease and flour 9×13 inch cake tin.

In bowl beat eggs and oil until creamy. Add sugar and vanilla and beat well. Combine dry ingredients in a bowl. Slowly add this mixture to the egg mixture until combined. The batter will be very thick. Fold in the apples by using a wooden spoon. Spread better into prepared calls tip

Spread batter into prepared cake tin.

Bake at 175 deg for 45mins. Let cake cool on wire rack.

Sprinkle with icing sugar.
