

In my late 20's I decided it was time to see a lot more of the world but instead of taking the usual European trip I spent 12 fascinating months in Africa. I started in Morocco, next was Algeria, then hitchhiked across the Sahara and travelled through Mali, (Yes, Timbuktu does exist), Ivory Coast, Guinea, Liberia, Sierra Leone, Cameroon, Zaire, Zambia then further south through Botswana, Namibia, South Africa, Lesotho. I then went up the East via Zimbabwe and Malawi finishing in Kenya. Travelling in trucks on top of cargo, taking a train only to end up back at the start 3 days later, patting a cheetah, watching a plane load of bananas thrown out so the passengers could fit, sleeping under buses and illegally arriving in the Ivory Coast without a passport stamp. These are just a few memories.

We are both still members of CAEX and over the years have walked and travelled extensively with them in Vic and southern Australia. On retirement in 2014 we moved from Victoria to Port Macquarie, where we both became involved with the Douglas Vale Winery and I was also a volunteer at the Koala Hospital for a number of years.

Leigh & I love travelling and have been fortunate to visit a number of counties (see Leigh's Info for more details). I also left him home a few times, going to Bhutan with a girlfriend and Sri Lanka for my niece's wedding. I put most of our trips together, spending quite a while researching on the net, booking flights, hotels, trains & planes. We love to include unusual train trips and to see things in detail rather than a quick look so organised tours do not often suit us, although these days we often include an organised component.

I also enjoy doing photobooks of our trips and have an interest in birdwatching. I would not call myself a twitcher, but I do hope to see each Australian bird one day.

THE FIRE MUSEUM VISIT

The Mid North Coast Fire Museum was opened in November 2021 by a group of enthusiastic collectors, mostly former fireman, who, together, had built up a remarkable amount of firefighting memorabilia and equipment. Dee and Steve Watkinson came across it a few months ago and suggested a visit as a future activity. On 19th July, a large group of members (28) did just that, and we encourage members, who haven't been, to spend some time there. You'll find it at Stevens Street at Settlement Point. Check their Facebook page for



opening times, usually Wednesdays and Saturdays.

Our day started with a hot drink or breakfast at the Blackfish Café at Jordon's Boatshed; it was a great chance to catch up and for those new to the Branch to meet more members. We then moved en masse to the Museum where we were met by our guide Al, a former fireman, like most of the volunteers.

He introduced us to "Dennis", an impressively-restored fire truck originally built in 1935. You can see it in this group photograph. Once inside, Al led us on a brief tour of vintage equipment, a replica fire engine (1939), uniforms, and a large collection of newspaper cuttings and photos; all conserve the history of firefighting in the area.

My favourite story is one from 1988. The wives and girlfriends of serving firemen in town, fed up with the hours their partners were spending at the station, left miniature beds there while the men were out on a call. They were

made from shoe boxes, with lovely-crafted pillows and covers; do you think the men got the message? On a serious note, though, visitors do come away with a better understanding of how dedicated our firefighters have

always been, in what is an arduous and dangerous vocation. Some members, meanwhile, were having a wonderful time in the citrus orchard on the property. Quite a few took up an invitation to take home oranges, lemons, or kumquats as well as the more unusual citron.



We were at the Museum for about an hour and then went on to lunch at the Settlement Point Café. It rounded of an enjoyable

morning in the sun: a combination of friendship, fun, food and an interesting educational experience to boot. A big thank-you to Dee and Steve for finding this local gem of a museum and for organising the visit and the whole morning.


BOOK REVIEW
