It was a perfect day to travel approximately an hour to our 'Out & About' of the 'Moonlit Sanctuary' on Smith Lane Pearcedale. After the usual covid check in and showing of immunisation status, a cuppa in the café was next on the agenda to have time to read the map and find out that on the hour there would be demonstrations for approximately 10-15 minutes provided by the keepers on various animals. This is held in a small amphitheatre.



Unfortunately, we missed the first one at 11am which was on 'How to Train a Dingo', as we were too busy watching the Southern Hairy Nosed Wombat being given a metal container of food on a chain which was tied to the fence. He knew what to do. When he was halfway down the container and he could not get any more food, he then proceeded to head butt the container about 4 times up in the air until the contents fell on to the ground – you can't outwit

We then followed the map in a clockwise direction entering a walk-in Bush Bird

a determined Wombat!

Aviary spotting various birds of the bush. Then passed a large bird aviary of a Red Tailed and a Yellow Tailed Cockatoo, plus a Major Mitchell and two Gang Gang Cockatoos. The Major Mitchell was very curious of us (see photo).

Past the playground and into the Koala area where the animals are easy to see and some were active. The lizard enclosure had Water Dragons, Turtles and Blue Tongue

Lizards. In the next door cage was a young Lace Monitor Lizard (goanna).



Heading towards the Show Arena, passing more birds – Bower Birds, Sacred Kingfisher, Barn Owls, Tawny Frogmouth, Emu etc. We made the 12noon showing in time and the keeper had a Shingle Backed Blue Tongue Lizard and a Southern Eastern Python (carpet snake), the latter was a real poser for the cameras. The demonstration was very good, giving lots of information on their habitat, food and how they care for them at the Sanctuary.



Time for lunch, so headed back to the little café and this time making sure we made the 1pm Show Arena. It was the turn of the birds. A Tawny Frog Mouth and a Barking Owl. I knew a little of the Tawny Frog Mouth who belongs to the Night Jar family and is not an Owl at all as a pair nested and reared a young one in one of the tall gum trees at school. The Barking Owl was noisy and kept barking all the time and when the keepers didn't give him his reward food when he thought he should have it, gave a low growling sound as much to say – 'Well where is my reward?'



After leaving the display, the Cape Barron Geese, who roamed freely, were being fed by some little children. We

moved onto to the snake enclosure which is still being developed with our friends

the Shingle Back, Southern Eastern Python and one other Python



Continuing on to the Orange Bellied Parrot Breading Facility and Display. The Sanctuary are in a breading program with Healesville

Sanctuary to increase these parrots back in to the wild. So far, they have released 20 parrots. The Grey Kangaroos and Wallabies were very friendly especially if you happen to have a pot of food which was available for

purchase from the café. As I was feeding one of the kangaroos, a keeper walked past and said 'This kangaroo loves to have his chest patted'. Well, he was just like dog, went into a complete trance and loved the attention.



Kookaburras, Lorikeets and Bush Stone Curlews. Then the two magnificent Wedge Tailed Eagles. Both of these Eagles are rescued, the male from Gippsland and the female from near Bendigo way. There is a write up about them on their cage.

The two Dingos were being taken for a walk and they looked magnificent. They had a large enclosure further on. There were also the most contented looking pair of Tassie Devils sunning themselves



It was a really good days outing and thank you once again Chris for organising it. We all agreed that it was in some ways better than Healesville as it has easy access to the animals, paths were flat and well maintained. There was a picnic area to the left of the café if you preferred to bring your own food. Will definitely visit again.

Two of my grandchildren and their parents have visited since and agree it is a great place to see Aussie animals up close.

Emergencyplus is an app you can put on your mobile. (It was recommended by a trainer who trained the staff at my school.)

You can choose to load onto an Apple or Android system (2nd choice).

When loaded the right-hand screen will appear.

The OOO Emergency, SES & Police are <u>live buttons</u> that will

automatically call that service when pressed.

Also, you will note your 'location coordinates' appear so you can pass the information to the service concerned as to where your location is.



Update your medicines list now – you'll need it if you go to hospital



A medicine list is a complete list of all your prescriptions, over the counter and complementary medicines.

Now is the time to make sure you have that list upto-date and easy to find in case you unexpectedly have to go to hospital or visit a doctor or pharmacist who is not familiar with your health status.

Experts Call for Pension Certainty

National Seniors first pre-election webinar, 'Is the pension fair?', highlighted the need for politicians to assure older Australians the pension will continue.

Experts at our recent 'Is the pension fair?' webinar described the Age Pension as a critical base for delivering income adequacy in retirement.

The webinar is the first of a pre-election series covering issues of concern to older Australians and was hosted by Chief Advocate Ian Henschke and featured key retirement income experts Noel Whittaker, Dr Debra Ralston and Dr David Knox.

Discussing the ins and outs of the present pension system, the panellists argued the government (and opposition) should do more to alleviate fears it might someday disappear. They noted the pension in its current form is fiscally sustainable.

As Dr Deborah Ralston noted, "One of the strengths of the Age Pension is that it is targeted well at people who really need it and improves equity in retirement for those who haven't been able to save much."

This was supported by Dr Knox who commented that while we are facing additional costs from other related spending areas such as aged care, Australia is headed towards having the "lowest cost Age Pension of any OECD country" by 2050.

The Pension System in Australia is extremely complicated

Panellists agreed Australia's pension system is very complex. It was also acknowledged that while the system works well for some, it doesn't for others.

As Dr David Knox pointed out "the current age pension system is incredibly complicated in Australia. Very few people understand it and therefore people do miss out as it's hard for people to get all the benefits available to them."

While many retirees enjoy a much higher standard of living than past generations, the reliance on savings derived from employment to top-up the pension means some people have limited savings and income in retirement.

As was highlighted in the webinar, retirees may have limited savings to supplement the Age Pension if they haven't worked or been forced out of the workforce early through ill health, been divorced, worked in low paid

jobs or jobs where the superannuation guarantee doesn't apply, may have limited savings to supplement the Age Pension.

Poverty in retirement is also exacerbated if a retiree cannot afford their own home and rely on the rental market.

"The people doing it tough are the single people having to rent," said Noel Whittaker.

This point was echoed by Dr Ralston, who said the Retirement Income Review (of which she was a panel member) found renters were a key concern because support was not keeping pace with rental costs.

"When we did the review, we found that Commonwealth Rent Assistance has not kept pace with the cost of housing, which is a serious concern."

With the superannuation system still immature and in need of further refinement, it could be some time before the savings and incomes of most retirees are adequate.
