North East Victoria – 'Silo Art Trail' Tour

Nothing could dampen our spirits on the wintry morning of 17th May. We were eager to be off with 'Day Tripper Tours' to seethe 'Silo & Street Art' which has proliferated across the NE Region of Victoria in recent years, and to see and experience local history and rural life – a 'jam packed' itinerary.

We were in the capable hands of Kevin, known from previous trips to be an excellent tour leader; unflappable, tireless, cheerful and a great driver. After muster and morning tea at Ringwood Lake, plus a brief diversion into Fitzroy to see some local murals, we were soon heading north, delighted to see clearing skies and wide open landscapes.



We viewed our first Silos after lunch and a talk by local June at the Co-op Colbinabbin General Store. The colourful work of Benalla artists Tim Bowtell's 5 Silos, telling the story of the district from the early days of farmer's picnics, steam engines carrying away the grain, the CFA engines and workers, to the many sports that enrich the communal and social life today.

At Rochester, the work of Melbourne based Jimmy Dvate reveals his love and concern for endangered species, depicting here on 2 Silos, a wonderful Sugar Glider next to an Azure King Fisher in the bush. Driving through Tongala was delightful; the town has become an 'Art Gallery' of more than 50 murals painted by street artists, depicting the history and lifestyle of people in the district. Towards dusk we reached Kyabram, where 2 hug water tanks owned by Goulbourn Water featured Dvate's wonderful spotted quoll, dancing brolgas and wetland



birds. Tired and happy we arrived at the $4\frac{1}{2}$ star Gateways Motel in Wangaratta the home base for our tour. Our accommodation was luxurious comfort and the wonderful Atorium Restaurant provided first class service, fine dining and the opportunity to relax and socialise each evening.

Day 2 with a focus on history was in Rutherglen. Stepping back in time we saw a blacksmith at work in an old converted stable and learned there is a revival of interest in the trade. A trip to the beautifully preserved Gold Battery followed. Here a series of videos demonstrated how the Battery worked - amazing in those time.

Lunch at the famed 'Parker Pies' was a treat. S super busy place which is testament to the popularity of their goodies. Next was a sunny walk to the Rutherglen Common School, which is now a well stocked Museum. Built in 1872, it was the first Public School to open in Victoria. David who is the founder and curator of the Museum gave an amusing and informative talk about those early days and his wife Martha demystified unfamiliar curiosities on show. Many items stirred our memory banks.

Mid afternoon we were enjoying a 'Wine & Cheese Tasting' at De Bortoli's Rutherglen Estate Winery. An interesting commentary explained the new varieties of grapes which are being grown today reflecting the changing palates and trends. A goodly number of bottles were purchased and we headed back to our motel after a wonderful day.

We were fortunate to have commentary of a very knowledgeable local man Lindsay for our third day as we travelled through wine regions and farmland. On our left we passed many hectares of dead trees, thousands in number – bleak and disturbing. We arrived for morning tea and talk at the Mokoan Hub & Café, the Information Centre for the Wetlands Rehabilitation Project.

Comprising of 8,750 hectares of Crown Land and co-managed by scientists, indigenous elders, tourism, local stakeholder and government, it is the largest project of its kind in the Southern Hemisphere and



is well underway re-establishing permanent water ponds for fish and bird life with replanting red gums and other native flora thereby restoring he habitat of many endangered species. It was great to leave with the inspiring and encouraging vision of how the area will be as it recovers its health and purpose.

On to the village of Goorambat, tiny yet 'Big in Art'. Drake has painted 'Milli' the famous Barking Owl (at Healesville) opposite a full size gum tree with large nesting hole, so vital for breeding and survival. The third silo features Clem, Sam and Banjo the 3 Clydesdales in

working harness. Simply superb!

They stand opposite the Digger's Wife Café where we had lunch before walking to the old Uniting Church to see the contemplative mural painted by Melbourne artist Matt Adnate, titled 'Sophia' which is the face of a serene



young woman representing the female aspect of the Holy Spirit.

Close by at Devenish, is the work of artists Cam Scale commemorating he districts military history and contribution. A contemporary Arm Nurse stand with a WW2Sister, flanked by a Digger and his horse. Many rural youths have heeded the call to serve for their country.





At St James we saw 4 grain silos painted by Tim Bowtell depicting the early wheat farming days and rural life of the district. Also a portrait of G J Coles a famous son of St James who founded the Coles Empire. He began by opening his first store in Smith Street Collingwood in April 1914, with the slogan '*nothing over 2/-*' and then a second and the rest is history. His father also named George, had a shop in St James in 1882.

West Australian artists Sobrane Simcock painted the 3 large silos at Tungamah, featuring a host of wetland birds in riotous

colour. Our last stop was the Water Tank we came upon driving back through the wasteland of dead trees. Painted by Guido Van Helten, it is the face of a weary CFA Volunteer in homage to the many who provided this vital service. Leaving the Winton area we passed vast Solar Farms providing AGL with green solar power - a good note on which to end a memorable day.



Day 4 Lindsay joined us again and provided commentary of the street art which has made Benalla famous. They started the '*Street Art Festival*' in 2015 and hundreds of Australian and international artists have painted the 84 murals enlivening the city. Driving around the lovely township, we admired many of them.

A visit to the Benalla Art Gallery for a talk by the curator and a chance to view the current exhibitions was a change of pace and lovely to enjoy lunch at the Gallery Café. On leaving we had a chance to admire an arresting and powerful bronze sculpture of Sir 'Weary' Dunlop with 2 war mates, before heading off to stretch our legs in the Botanical Gardens and then walking across the bridge to explore the whimsical Ceramic Mural – a Gaudi inspired structure, delightful for young and old alike.

A guided tour of Benalla's Kelly & Costume Museum followed, full of history and some unusual items. A great note on which to end our day.

Homeward bound on day t, we passed through Glenrowan and Kelly Country with his statues and likeness on full display. Arriving at Tatong we saw the beautiful Water Tank mural – a scene of the '*Kelly Gang Prospecting in the Tatong Hills*' painted by Michael Larkin, famous for his finely detailed delicate work which could grace any art gallery.

Morning tea was at Buck's Bakehouse in Yark, a busy place offering treats and a welcome break, then on to lunch at Healesville RSL. Sadly our wonderful trip was over. We said our goodbyes and boarded various mini busses which took us home with laundry to be done, stories of wonderful experiences to be shared and good memories to keep.

Emergencyplus is an app you can put on your mobile. (It was recommended by a trainer who trained the staff at my school.)

You can choose to load onto an Apple or Android system (2nd choice).

When loaded the right hand screen will appear.

The **OOO Emergency**, **SES** & **Police** are <u>live buttons</u> that will automatically call that service when pressed.

Also you will note your 'location coordinates' appear so you can pass the information to the service concerned as to where your location is.

Update your medicines list now – you'll need it if you go to hospital



A medicine list is a complete list of all your prescriptions, over the counter and complementary medicines.

Now is the time to make sure you have that list upto-date and easy to find in case you unexpectedly have to go to hospital or visit a doctor or pharmacist who is not familiar with your health status.

Downsizing your Home

If you choose to downsize, you can benefit from the Federal Government's downsizing initiative. This means that if you're aged 65 or more, you can sell your principal residence (which needs to have been owned for at least 10 years) and use the proceeds to make a non-concessional (after-tax) contribution of up to \$300,000 to your superannuation for an individual, or up to \$600,000 for a couple. Known as Downsizer contributions, these do not count towards your superannuation contribution caps. To learn more, visit the <u>ATO website</u>

• Smaller homes may be easier and less costly to maintain.

- Can provide an opportunity to move closer to family members, or to a neighbourhood that is closer to amenities and services that will be useful in later life.
- Any remaining funds after purchasing a lower-priced property can be used to diversify investments, clear debt or supplement retirement income without incurring a debt

Be Aware That

- Limited availability of lower-priced accommodation can mean having to move to a different location to secure reasonable downsizing funds. This can mean leaving friends and family behind.
- Once legal and transaction costs, stamp duty and moving expenses are taken into account, your funds could be substantially eroded.
- Downsizing can have a potentially adverse impact on assets and income tests used to assess Age Pension eligibility

Just over 42% of people have no intention to move or downsize from their family home. If you would prefer to unlock some of your home equity but stay at home, you might like to consider a **Reverse Mortgage**, or the Federal Government's <u>Pension Loans Scheme</u>.

Scam Watch - EOFY Warning

According to the Australian Competition & Consumer Commission, Australians lost \$851 million to scams in 2020. And that's not including the amount lost by people too embarrassed to admit they'd been conned. The end of financial year (EOFY) is a busy time for cyber criminals. Here are a few scams you should be aware of.

The Australian Taxation Office (ATO) has a whole page dedicated to impersonation scams, which shows just how frequently they occur.

'*Your Tax File Number has been suspended*' is a common warning issued by scammers pretending to be from the ATO.

It is often sent via email or recorded phone message.

You might have recently received a call like this one.

Don't... press 1.

Do... report the scam here. You can also call the ATO on **1800 008 540**.

And remember...

"The ATO does not suspend Tax File Numbers and will never request you pay a fine or transfer money in order to protect your TFN pending legal action" - The Australian Taxation Office

Update your 'myGovID' details

Scammers usually send this request via email. They want you to click on the link and provide your personal details. Do not do this.

A legitimate email or SMS notification will never contain a link to your myGov account.

If you receive a suspicious email, report it to ScamWatch.

If you clicked on a link or provided your personal information by mistake, contact Services

You are entitled to a tax refund

This message is usually sent via SMS or email. It encourages you to enter your personal details via an online form to claim your refund.

Sounds too good to be true, right? Yep. The only thing you might gain from filling out a form or clicking on a suspicious link is some malicious software downloaded to your device.

Scammers can also use your personal information to steal your money and identity.

If in doubt, use an independent source such as Google Search to look up the correct details of the ATO and call them to confirm whether the message was legitimate.

When a legitimate tax refund is available, you will receive a text or email from the ATO encouraging you to log in to your myGov account.

This message will not contain any forms or links to click on.

The ATO will never ask you to respond to an SMS or email by providing personal information.

If you have linked your myGov account to the ATO, you can check the progress of your tax return anytime.

Sign in or create an account here.

Scams have become more sophisticated over time, but that doesn't mean you should be fearful of using technology.

Keep your personal information secure, avoid clicking on suspicious looking links or websites, and trust your instincts if something '*just doesn't feel right*.'
