SPECIAL GENERAL MEETING – CONSTITUTION VOTE

As you will be aware our branch is holding a Special General Meeting (SGM) at 10am on Thursday 13th June immediately before our 'Plastics in the Indian Ocean' Branch meeting. The SGM has been called to alter the Rules (Constitution) of our Branch.

You may be aware there are three reasons to amend the Constitution:

- A new Constitution for National Seniors Australia Ltd (the national organisation based in Brisbane) was accepted in September 2018. Branch constitutions require updating to reflect changes in the national organisation.
- The deadline to change and submit our Constitution to conform to changes included in the West Australian Associations Incorporation Act 2015 is 1 July 2019. All associations like ours in WA are obliged to do this.
- The Floreat Branch management committee passed a resolution in March 2019 to change the name of the Branch to 'National Seniors Australia. Perth Western Suburbs Branch Inc.'

Many WA branches have already accepted the new Rules and submitted them. We will be the last to hold our SGM, given the cycle of our monthly meetings.

Changing the name to 'National Seniors Australia, Perth Western Suburbs Branch' will be the most noticeable outcome for members from adopting the new Rules. You can be part of the history of our Branch by voting for this change.

I am hoping we can efficiently establish the quorum of 29 and vote on the Resolution to accept the amended Rules, as distributed, in ten minutes. There is no opportunity to change the amendments or accept different amendments. Members intending to vote should have decided whether they wish to accept the new Rules or not, as there will be no opportunity for discussion. The amended constitution will be accepted if 75% of the current membership present who vote support the resolution.

Remember to bring your current NSA membership card with you to show that you are a current member and eligible to vote on this history-making occasion!

VISIT TO NEW NORCIA 16/05/2019

In about 1840, Spain decided to abolish all community religious orders and in doing so the creation of New Norcia Abbey was made possible. Two Benedictine monks, Rosendo Salvado and Joseph Serra decided to travel halfway round the world, to Western Australia, to carry on their religious work helping the needy who had arrived in Fremantle in the 1840's. They walked the ~ 150km to an area 8km north of the present site in 1846 and determined to establish a mission to convert local Aboriginal people, and in 1847 set about initiating the complex that we see today.

A party of 33 of our members visited the complex on 16/05/2019 and all enjoyed and admired the monks' efforts and skills in producing the buildings and services that they created in a land so different and so far away from the land of their birth.

Although it was not possible to tour the Monastery there was plenty to see and our humorous monk guide, Brother Chris, introduced us to the Abbey and a beautiful chapel in one of the schools, as well as the Original Abbey Church with many lovely frescos, and lots of interesting information relating to New Norcia's history. After lunch at the New

Norcia Hotel, a part of the complex, we had some time to visit the museum and art gallery which have many items you will not see anywhere else but are part of our history. The cardinal's cape alone is an extraordinary piece of craftsmanship. I did manage to buy a New Norcia 7 grain loaf of bread and found it to be the nicest bread I have ever tasted.

I must confess that I did not think our April guest speaker's subject would interest me, but I was so wrong. I recognise the importance of a father-son relationship but Wayne Bradshaw gave me lots

more to think about. I grew up at a time when children were seen and not heard and affection was almost regarded as a weakness. Fathers were accepted as the provider of our living conditions and as the breadwinner of the family, while mother made sure we ate properly, were polite, taught

us respect for our elders and good manners. Much has changed during the last few decades with both parents sharing the responsibilities associated with bring up children, but there are young parents today who never experienced what we may consider a well- balanced childhood - the head of the family may be unemployed or working away from home and unable to bond with his children. There also may be two generations of children growing up in families who have been without the security of employed parents and the dignity associated with being able to meet family's daily needs.

The booklet prepared by the Fathering Project has so many sensible suggestions. It goes a long way to advise parents, not only of their children's needs, but their own actions needed to bind the bond between them. Maybe a booklet for mothers would also be useful. I thank Wayne for making me aware of this problem and action being taken to help those in need of help and the joy those fathers will enjoy by taking note of the suggestions in the booklet.
