OUR APRIL GUEST SPEAKER

A very informative talk was given by Owen, a pilot from AngelFlight. Owen is a former farmer from Port Douglas who moved to Adelaide 20 years ago. He loves flying his "Moonie" small plane.

- AngelFlight began in April 2003 when a need was identified for transport of people who did not have an emergency medical reason to be transported.
- Emergency medical patients are transported by the Royal Flying Doctor or CareFlight.
- AngelFlight does not own any planes or have many staff. There are six staff in Queensland who run the office and all pilots and drivers are volunteers.
- AngelFlight is a national organization that fills a gap in services to people living in remote areas Australia wide
- The organization has undertaken over 51,900 flights in less than 20 years
- Provide flights for non-urgent medical and other reasons where flights are not available due to distance or cost:
 - o getting specialist appointments, to chemotherapy sessions, etc.

- RDFS will transport emergency patients to hospital, but will not transport them back home.
- Trips for chemotherapy every 3 4 weeks would be too costly for patients on commercial flights

o Compassionate reasons

- ➤ Families are flown to spend time with country patients undergoing long-term treatment and also flown home.
- During COVID flying people to see dying family members.
- Transporting people escaping Domestic Violence
- Emergency supplies, ie flood victims. During the Lismore floods AngelFlight took donated goods to the people of Lismore
- o Taking people where no other organisation will take them. Have transported all age groups, from a 10 day old baby up to 90 year old people.

Limits

- o the patient doesn't require in-flight care as there isn't enough room for medical staff or equipment
- o not eligible for RFDS or other options
- o no time-critical appointments (transplants, etc), as AngelFlight cannot guarantee that timelines will be met.
- o person must be able to physically get into a small plane as there are no stairs, toilets or services. Planes are as small as 4 seater; some are 8-10 seaters or a couple of jets. Flights from Adelaide to Port Lincoln take one hour, must be able to do this length.
- AngelFlight is free for those transported. Most airports waive landing charges. Classed as a private flight due to no fees and volunteer pilots. There are 3,000 pilot volunteers around Australia.
- Pilots either own their own aircraft or hire one for the flight.
- Receive no Government grants. AVGAS is expensive but AngelFlight pays for fuel based on the aircraft type. Pilots service their own aircraft. Overheads for the organization are low.
- No Government grants, no active fundraising and no paid advertising; only community service ads on TV.

- Spontaneous donations, bequests and corporate sponsors keep them operating. In 2020/21 donations, bequests and spontaneous donations amounted to \$1.95 million.
- Pilots must have a minimum of 250 hours after gaining their licence. Average experience of pilots is 3,300 hours.
- No pilot is pressured to undertake a flight and last minute cancellations are never criticised.
- Drivers on the ground are also volunteers.
 They pick people up from airport, take to appointment and bring them back to the airport. Occasionally they take the person for a coffee or kids to the park to play.
- People can get a referral from a health professional or apply directly to AngelFlight, who will liaise with health professionals.

Why do they volunteer?

- They get to fly to a variety of airfields they usually don't get to – capital cities, country towns, individual farms or roads in the outback.
- Helping people forget their treatment or after treatment, the pain or process.
- The sometimes drop off supplies and pick up people in a double run.
