OUR GUEST SPEAKER = BLAKE STONE

Our guest speaker for April was Blake Stone, Operations Manager at Billabong Zoo.



Blake gave us an insight into various aspects of the running of our much-loved local zoo. We learned lots about the number of species of animals and birds at the zoo, where they were sourced from and in some cases where some are sent to including several other zoos around Australia. It was interesting to also learn about feeding habits together with the enormous cost in obtaining a variety of different foods. Some local fruit and veg outlets save unused stock which is picked up regularly by Blake and his team. Blake also explained how they keep the numbers in check by de-sexing programs. They are also in the throws of bringing new

animals in from zoos including Taronga in Sydney. The zoo is a family run business employing 35 full-time staff all trained in handling specific areas such as big cats, reptiles, roos, dingos, meercats, and of course the various breeds of birds.

Most of the patronage at the zoo is from visitors passing through, and the use of road signage which is very effective. They are always looking to improve the zoo and have recently added a fully licensed function area being served by 3 qualified full-time chefs.

Blake and his family are very aware of the benefits of being active in the community, always willing to put on special shows around Port Macquarie and surrounding areas. He also thanked the team at Hastings River Cruises and Ken Little Fruit & Veg for their support.

Lots of great questions were happily answered by Blake. Thanks and a presentation were made to Blake by Allan Randall.

Getting Involved in National Seniors Advocacy

At the April Branch meeting a question from the floor was tended by a member. Essentially the question as I understand it was to enquire as to how we as members of National Seniors raise issues that impact on us or that are of <u>concern to us.</u>

Issues can be raised by members and relayed to Head Office in a number or ways. These include;

- By participating in the on-line National Seniors social survey. This is an annual survey that involves the National Seniors Research team developing the survey and analyzing the results. The analysis culminates in the publication of reports and is the primary information guiding our advocacy and budget submissions at both the state and federal government levels. The Research team who are professionally qualified employ rigorous analysis and ethics processes. Recent reports include 'Social Connectiveness and Isolation,' 'Elements of Ageism', Older Peoples Financial Wellbeing and Preferences' and Dementia 'Experiences Planning and Worry'. Please participate in the annual social survey it is important.
- By raising issues at a Branch level. In the past this has been part of our Planning Forum where members have raised issues such as 'loneliness,' 'dental care,' 'working in retirement', 'age care', pensioner payments', 'cost of living' and concessions'. Our Planning Forum report is sent to Head Office each year.
- By contacting Head Office direct. Members are encouraged to raise issues with Head Office via the NS Web site or by contacting members of staff directly. NS have a membership/Branch liaison person Karen Furnivall who is always very helpful. The membership team can be contacted on 1300 76 50 50
- By being part of one of the various *Policy Advisory Groups*. These groups are normally state based but provide an opportunity to be part of the debate on specific issues. Outcomes from these debates are sent onto the Director Policy and Research.

A great way to keep abreast of issues impacting older Australians is to spend time on the National Seniors Web site. There is a myriad of good information to glean through including services provided, research reports, Branch news etc. Our web site is linked to the NS main website so check out both websites. Ron is doing a great job with our Branch website.

'Guulabaa,' which means 'Place of Koala'

Eighteen intrepid National Seniors took off on another adventure today (17/4/25) and visited the new Koala conservation breeding program and hospital centre called 'Guulabaa,' The centre is located just west of the Billabong Zoo turnoff.



Marie our tour guide took us on a 1 hour tour, she was excellent at explaining all the interesting facts of the breeding program and how they have 18 prospective Koalas for breeding, 8 females and 10 males, they have 53 Koalas in total. Once the joeys are around 18 months the mother says you're on your own now. If all is OK with the offspring, he/she is released into the wild.

Marie also pointed us out to the Koala's at the centre, they were Phil, Nero, Trish, Casper and Benny. It is beautifully setup for viewing with timber decks all around. There were lots of people there, a large group of kids were trying out the Wild Nets, felt like having a go myself.



After Guulabaa we headed back into town to the old Koala hospital for a guided tour. As they are moving all the Koalas to the Guulabaa centre in a couple of weeks there was not a lot to see, although there were still a few Koalas there. The old hospital is going to be completely rebuilt with a new state of the art hospital. Good luck to them and their endeavour's, they are a very dedicated group of people and most are volunteers.



After the tour we had an hour or so in one of the beautiful old rooms at Roto House for a lovely lunch. Very enjoyable, everyone had a great time.
