LOOKING AHEAD

Branch Meeting Thursday, February 8th, 9.30 for 10am. This will be held at the Mt Claremont Community Centre as usual. Preliminaries will be attended to by our redoubtable Secretary Derek Cockle and our new member Anthony Tunniclife will give a brief recount on a little known confrontation Australia and the UK had with Indonesia in the 1960's. At the time of writing, the main guest speaker will most likely be Stacey Price, from Northern Suburbs Community legal centre. Here is Geoff Jones take on what she will be covering -------

Many people wish to help younger people in their family who may be struggling with various aspects of their lives. In these days of high deposits, high rents, and higher interest rates, many older people are helping younger family members to get a start in buying their own home or providing other financial support. This often works well for all involved, yet the 'bank of mum and dad' often does not have the same protections as regular banks and other sources of finances. What can older people do if promises to pay back are not met or the arrangement goes sour in other ways.

This month Stacey Price, solicitor, will discuss financial abuse and more during the NSA Western Suburbs Branch meeting on Thursday 8th February.

Ms Price works with the Northen Suburbs Community Legal Centre, which serves people in the cities of Subiaco, Cambridge, and Stirling as well as further north. The Legal Centre is well known for its Older People's Rights service including its peer education program and recently publishing a first ever 'Best Practice Guidelines for Interviewing Older People at Risk' in 2023.

Ms Price and her team will give an overview of how the Centre can assist older people and then focus in on family agreements such as when parents lend money to adult children, parents re-financing to help their adult children, adult children moving back into the family home and granny flat arrangements. Branch Meeting Thursday, March 15th, 9.30 for 10.00am. This will be held at the Mt Claremont Community, as usual. The guest speaker(s) will be a team from Kate Chaney's office, delivering on "Curtin Zero", and one can draw one's own conclusion about this, but it might be assumed that it is on aiming for zero emissions in the electorate of Curtin – but what about pollution from the neighbours?

MEMBER TRAVELS

The following is a portrait of Bulgaria as drawn by our member, Mary Carroll who travelled there in April, 2023.

Bulgaria - An Eastern European Adventure Part 1

Bulgaria with a population of around seven million, is a parliamentary democracy. It was admitted to NATO in 2004 and became a member of the EU in 2007. It was one of very few countries that successfully withstood the demands to deport their ethnic Jewish population in WW 11 and in 1988.

My first impression of Bulgaria was of endless green early Spring fields, no visible farm machinery, few people, and no livestock, except for a small flock of sheep on the move. In the villages, abandoned block-like Soviet factories, now forlorn, dilapidated buildings, empty, once hives of industry but like the many houses, also derelict. Disturbing to see broken windows and peeling paint on some quite stylish houses.

The Soviet Union pulled out in 1989 after occupying the country since 1944. The factory closures meant no other employment for many workers who then left to seek work in other countries, hoping to eventually return to sell their properties in better times. However, Bulgaria remains a poor country with a low cost of living and mostly, a cash economy. Their currency is the Lev.

Framed by Romania, the other side of the vital Danube River, the Black Sea and some impressive resorts to its east, Serbia and Macedonia to its west, and Greece and Turkey, to the south, Bulgaria is a country of wonder and surprise; mountains, lakes, plains, and historic monuments make it a great off- the-beaten track country, to visit.

Considered a Second World country like Hungary; Bulgaria has had an extremely long and torrid history of brutal conflicts, invasions, bitter battles, treaties, occupation, uprisings, and division. In 395AD, the Roman occupying force split in two and Bulgaria became part of the Eastern Roman Empire. Great Bulgaria was formed in 632AD, making it the oldest country in Europe. Its founding tribe was the Bulgars lead by Khan Kubrat their Turkic tribesman leader from the Asian Steppes.
