



BRANCH NEWS: A VISIT TO EUNGAI BUFFALO FARM

Thirty-four of our members took advantage of a beautiful autumn day and enjoyed meandering around the Kempsey riverside markets. Many bargains were found and greetings exchanged before we travelled north to the Eungai Creek Buffalo farm and café for lunch.







Our host regaled us with stories of his very spoilt and indulged Italian water buffalo. Their pure white milk has 50% more calcium, 40% more protein and 43% less cholesterol than cows' milk. The price of buffalo milk, which is creamier and sweeter than cows' milk, is \$4.50 wholesale against cows' milk at 51 cents per litre but this is offset by the large expense of testing and strict regulations of Health and Safety.

We were told that one of the buffalo, Bessie, was an escapologist and, when pregnant, found it difficult to jump the

fences so repairs were continuous. A few of our members found, to their shock, that electric fence wire was introduced to prevent Bessie and her brood seeking greener pastures. We had a wonderful, entertaining day and arrived home with many purchases from the markets and farm.

We have invited a Palliative Care Nurse to come to talk to the Branch in June. Before then, we thought it would be interesting to find out a little bit more about how Hastings Home Care supports palliative care in our Community

HASTINGS HOME HOSPICE (By Marita Crighton, Secretary)

Home Hospice was formed in 1998 to provide support to residents in the local government area who are clients of the Palliative Care Service. Its motto is "helping to ease the hardship".

Many patients need an oxygen supply and we own several units. There is a great need for pain control and a syringe driver can supply up to 24 hours of medication through a small device that can be worn on the body for ambulation. These units require regular maintenance, which we pay for.

When a patient is being nursed in their home, care may be made easier with the use of the appropriate equipment. Caring for an ill person in a large bed can be very difficult for

both patient and carer. Having an electric single bed that is totally adjustable makes a big difference. Also, having equipment such as an over-bed table, shower chair, toilet raisers and commodes etc. is very useful. Wheelchairs enable a frail person to be moved around the home, as well as making it easier to be taken out, for social outings or doctors appointments.

All our equipment is loaned free of charge to those who will benefit from it. A common request is for financial assistance with medications; these can be expensive and beyond many families' resources, especially when the patient or carer has had to retire from paid work. We can also provide monies for special food supplements and will consider any request made to us.

We are also supportive of the Palliative Care Unit at Wauchope. Recently we were able to provide funds to replace some of the curtains, which have to be washed regularly. We helped purchase some equipment and furnishings when the Unit was established. The requests for support come through the three Palliative Care Nurses who are on our committee, as well as through the Director Of Nursing of the Palliative Care Unit at Wauchope. We give help only to residents in our Local Government area who must be a client of the Palliative Care Service.

We receive no Government support and rely on the monies our very small band of volunteers can raise through cake and craft stalls and donations from our generous community. Our next Trading Table will be held at Settlement City on Saturday 15 May.

John was at a Board meeting of NSA this month. There was a great deal to read, digest and discuss at the meeting but John has kindly put together a brief summary for us:

- Louise O'Neill, CEO of the Aged Care Workforce Industry Council presented a comprehensive overview of workforce issues regarding aged care. CEO Prof John McCallum represents NS on the Council. Significant changes are being proposed.
- 4 As a result of an extension of a government grant NS is continuing to support older Australians via the COVID hotline. Many callers are now enquiring about the vaccination program. The hotline is also supporting a range of ethnic communities who have COVID related concerns.
- ♣NS as part of 'Building Better Homes' campaign has been instrumental in securing more accessible housing regulations for older Australians.
- ♣ There is a strong expectation by members that more home care packages will emanate. from the upcoming federal budget. NS has had a lead role in progressing this issue.
- 4 NS is developing a range of strategic partnerships that will have mutual benefits for both parties. Most advanced of these partnership arrangements is with a superannuation fund.
- ♣ Membership is up on the previous reporting period. 44% of new members are in the 50 to 60 age group. The membership database is still in phase 1 of development and meaningful data is not yet available to Branches.
- Lorrent NS research includes; Older Australians Sentiments on Vaccination; Co-Design Improving the Aged Care System, NS/Challenger Report on Planning for Later Life, Older Drivers and Automated Driving Assistance (with UNSW).
- ♣ Members have suggested NS campaigns on; Fixing Pension Poverty, Better Housing, Health Costs especially Specialist Fees, Fairness in Retirement and the Federal Budget.


HOW WELL DO YOU KNOW PORT?


LAST MONTH'S ANSWER
