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A DONATION FROM THE COMMUNITY PARTNERSHIP PROGRAMME



At a Regional Australia Bank function in the Westport Club, our newly-married couple, Judith and Keith Reichenbach, gratefully accepted \$70.27 on behalf of the Branch. This donation was part of the Bank's Community Partnership Program. As we have held accounts with the Bank for many years, we have been a recognised participant in the program since it started.

The Program is powered by bank members who wish to support community organisations. We received this

money because, when some of our members opened a S3 Community Partnership Account with the Bank, they chose to forego interest in order to nominate us as the community organisation they wished to support. This year, the Bank calculated 1% p.a. on the average account balance of these members and donated this amount to the Branch. The Regional Australia Bank has given away \$2.8 million of their pre-tax profits this year with this program. **A VERY BIG THANK YOU** to all our participating supporters whose generosity led to this donation.

SPEAKERS' CORNER



Our guest speaker for August was Mr Robert Dwyer, State member for Port Macquarie.

Robert was a very engaging and informative speaker, relating his previous experiences, as General Manager for the Laurieton United Services Club, and about the many charities with which he has been - and still is - involved. He has actively supported nearly one hundred organisations,

focused on youth, sports, and homelessness; he remains an active member of the hockey, surflifesaving and Rotary communities.

Robert mentioned his fourteen-year association with Leslie Williams and how he received 'the tap on the shoulder' when she was resigning. He has now been in Parliament for one hundred and forty-seven days, made forty-six speeches, met most of the Ministers and has, and will, make sure Port Macquarie's voice is heard. He is getting a lot of support from both Port Macquarie and Sydney in his new role.

In discussing pressing matters affecting Port Macquarie, Robert updated the meeting regarding the Wright's Road Intersection, proposed changes to the Donut, progress on housing affordability and availability and concerns about energy supplies.

Questions from the floor resulted in some information about the Ocean Pool, land allocation, mobile phone coverage, new housing subdivisions and lack of supporting infrastructure.

Robert was thanked for his attendance by Max Cross and ended by reminding us that he is available for consultation through his office or Social Media and encouraged everyone to follow his enewsletter to keep up-to-date with Port Macquarie news. (**Judith Clegg**)

SOMETHING ABOUT ME

The latest member to tell us something about her life was Suzanne Burrows. As part of a family with a strong social conscience, Suzanne was imbued at an early age with the desire to help others. She, and not her brother, was the one who often gave up her bed when her family took in those in need.

After a holiday job in the Communist Bookshop in Sydney, Suzanne chose another way to serve others. She studied Industrial Relations (IR) at a time when women in IR were few and far between, and was then offered a job with the Liquor Trades Union as an IR assistant. She credited this job as giving her the skills of attention to detail and discipline that stood her in good stead in the many IR roles she went on to play. She shared with the group some of her more memorable or important experiences such as:

• Helping a distraught bank employee, "Mary", who, while on maternity leave, found herself

pregnant again, the second baby due before the end of her first leave period. Maternity leave had only just been introduced and only for those who had worked twelve months "continuous" service: it did not cover this particular situation. Mary, with the help of her area manager, found an ingenious and practical way round the problem, leaving the courts to decide the issue.


- Working with managers and employees to write job evaluations for the new Modern Industrial Awards. Suspending normal workplace hierarchy during committee meetings was challenging for both sides. Some, though not all, managers thought that they knew best. She also discovered that women frequently underestimated their skills and experience in the workplace.
- As a union representative, taking part in particularly-quick industrial agreement negotiations, when she just "happened" to hear, with her head stuck in the paper towel dispenser, the discussions going on between managers in the adjoining male bathroom.
- Studying for a Graduate Diploma in Education, specialising in Adult Training and Development, and being offered a job with the Federal Health Department, training hospital staff to overcome prejudice and improve HIV/AIDS standards of care. Using the format of the popular ABC program "Hypotheticals", she mediated panel discussions before an audience of hospital/medical staff. Her job was to make sure that key messages were understood, about what HIV/AIDS is, how it could be caught, and how to protect oneself within a hospital setting.

After she and partner, David, an air-traffic controller for the Air Force, retired they moved from Canberra, seeking a warmer climate and, like many, chose Port Macquarie. With David's death, she is in a new phase of her life, including joining National Seniors where she has received a very warm welcome. Thank you, Suzanne, for the chance to get to know you better. **(Lynda Walters)**


