President's Report:

Throughout the month I receive many emails from various organisations that aim to keep seniors aware of what is happening, relevant to them, across Government providers.

The one thing I have noticed is that these emails contain jargon and language that requires several readings to fully understand what they are trying to convey. So, my reports will be a very short summary of some of this information. Should you require any more information than provided please let me know.

THE FUTURE OF AGEING AND AGE SERVICES

CEOs and executives from 112 age service providers have submitted their findings in a report to the Royal Commission into Aged Care Quality and Safety. This is the first time a cross-section of the sector has come together on this scale to discuss many of the issues and problems being faced by the aging sector.

Significant Outcomes of the report:- A consumer centered model of aged care services is needed so the elderly and their families have the right to choose high quality and safe services and who delivers them.

Aged care workers need to be respected for the work they do.

GORDON LEGAL TO FIGHT ILLEGAL ROBODEBT CLAWBACK (FED)

Gordon Legal is taking up the fight on behalf of a large group of people who have had their legitimate Centrelink benefits illegally taken back by the Federal Government through its Robodebt scheme.

They will challenge the Government use of a flawed calculation system by Centrelink to unlawfully takeback tens of millions of dollars from many thousands of Centrelink recipients, including pensioners.

The Morrison Government has increased its support for men battling prostate cancer through a Screening and Psychosocial Care for Men with Prostate Cancer program, developed by the Prostate Cancer Foundation of Australia. Prostate Cancer is the most common cancer in Australian men but these days there is a 95% survival rate. While this is undoubtedly a positive development, survivors of prostate cancer often have to deal with the side effects of their treatment for longer.

SUPPORT FOR MORE SENIOR AUSTRALIANS TO LIVE INDEPENDENTLY

The Morrison Government is delivering \$150 million over 3 years to enable more senior Australians to access entry-level home support. Around 18,000 seniors will benefit from an expansion of entry-level home support over the next 12 months. Seniors are increasingly choosing to remain in their own homes for longer and apparently the Government is committed to supporting this choice. However

WAITING LIST REDUCTION, A DROP IN THE OCEAN - ACSA (FED)

Aged and Community Services says the reported reduction in the home care

waiting list is welcome but there are still 119,000 people waiting for a package. This reduction of around 6% of people waiting for a package is unfortunately just a drop in the ocean of people desperately needing better support at home.

If people have to wait it can have a lasting impact on a person's health. It can lead to increased pressure on already stretched hospitals, mean someone has to enter residential care.

INCEREASE IN HOSPITALISED INJURY DUE TO FALLS IN OLDER PEOPLE

The rate of head injuries from falls by older Australians has nearly doubled over the past decade, according to a new report by the Australian Institute of Health and Welfare. Falls in older people shows that about 125,000 people aged 65 and over were seriously injured due to a fall in 2016-17. Injuries to the head hip and thigh were the most common.

National Seniors helping members address energy affordability

High energy prices continue to challenge households, especially those on low incomes.

In fact, the latest Australian Energy Regulator (AER) report describes the situation as "very concerning" and strongly encourages people who are having difficulty paying their bills to talk immediately to their energy retailer and seek assistance.

It is vital to seek assistance before debt gets out of hand.

The AER report assesses energy affordability based on how much of a household's disposable income is spent on energy.

The report found low-income households on the median market offer spend twice as much of their disposable income on energy as the average household.

The report said energy retailers were required by law to offer assistance to customers who find themselves in hardship.

As long as you are in a hardship program and meeting its conditions, you cannot legally be disconnected.

Support for customers and retailers

The AER released the Customer Hardship Policy Guideline in March to "strengthen protections for customers experiencing hardship" and bring greater clarity and consistency to the support retailers are required to provide.

New penalties will apply where retailers fail to meet their obligations.

BOOK RECOMMENDATION

"Unmarriageable" by Soniah Kamal

In this one-of-a-kind retelling of Pride and Prejudice set in modern-day Pakistan. Alys Binat has sworn never to marry—until an encounter with one Mr. Darsee at a wedding makes her reconsider.

This book shows how Jane Austen's work is timeless and applicable to all cultures. It also makes for deliciously readable romantic comedy and a commentary on class in post-colonial, post-partition Pakistan, where the effects of the British Empire still reverberate.

If you like Pride and Prejudice you should love this. It is available from the Joondalup Libraries.

A Guide to Native Bees of Australia by Terry Houston

Terry gave us a great talk on the topic of Native Bees at our last meeting. His book A Guide to Native Bees of Australia provides a detailed introduction to the estimated 2000 species of Australian bees.

Illustrated with stunning photographs, it describes the form and function of bees, their life-cycle stages, nest architecture, sociality and relationships with plants. It also contains systematic accounts of the five families and 58 genera of Australian bees. Photomicrographs of morphological characters and identification keys allow identification of bees to genus level.

Natural history enthusiasts, professional and amateur entomologists and beekeepers will find this an essential guide.
