Our September Guest Speaker – Sarah Shipton Scrapbooking and Card Making

- Sarah is a 'Stampin' Up' demonstrator, teaching scrapbooking and card making.
- Sarah's interest in her family history (and ultimately scrapbooking) started when she was in Grade 6 and her English teacher asked the class to do a book 'all about me'. She asked her grandfather to help her with their family history.
- Her grandfather went back to the UK to follow up ancestors who came to Australia. Over the years, he continued to send charts and documents to Sarah.
- The documents sat in a box until Sarah had a daughter of her own and went to a Baby Expo where she saw a family history book.
- As a stay-at-home mum with a five-month-old daughter, working on her family history gave her a sense of purpose.
- What started as a hobby 24 years ago, has now become a full-time job.
- Information about your family can come from
 - Physical documents passed down from family and extended members
 - Genealogy charts
 - Pedigree charts
 - Family History books
 - Hard copy books
 - Photos
 - Notes
 - Family tree
 - Ancestry.com (free version) could contain the family tree of other people you are related to.
 - War service records (free) original documents – when a person enlisted, etc
 - Births, Deaths and Marriages Have to pay for documents, but this information can sometimes be found on Ancestry.com
 - Museums

Advantages of Scrapbooking and Documenting Family History for Seniors

- Memory preservation and cognitive stimulation
 - Sorting through photos provides cognitive stimulation
 - Organising, planning and decision making
- Improved identity, sense of self, continuity
 - Tangible legacy
- Emotional wellbeing and processing
 - Joy, sense of belonging
- Social connection and intergenerational bonding
 - Tangible heritage to family
 - Family history is a work in progress something to leave behind for future generations
- Therapeutic and sensory engagement
- Support for seniors with memory issues/dementia

Collating and Documenting

Start with what you have Items you will need

- Paper trimmer
- Cardstock (white or black) !2" x 12"
 - Use original photos if you have them, but make sure you scan them first
 - Use black cardstock for photos with white borders
- Adhesive runner photo safe and lignin free
- Memory protectors slide sheets of cardstock into them
- D-ring Scrapbooking album for work in progress
- Embellishing is optional historical embellishments are available from time to time
- When writing in your scrapbook, use archival safe journal pen
