## Words of Wisdom

This newsletter will get out to readers as we say goodbye to Makuru (winter) and welcome Djilba the early part of spring. Days can be still very cold, some that are raining and windy. As the days start to warm up, you will hear and see the first of the new-born animals with their parents providing them with food, shelter and protection from other animals and people. The woodland birds will still be nest bound, hence the swooping behaviours of the Koolbardi (magpie), Djidi djidi (wagtail) and the Chuck-a-luck (wattle birds)

This is the start of the massive flowering explosion in the South West. It begins with yellow flowering plants such as the Acacias. You'll also notice cream and striking blue coloured flowers. As the season progresses and the temperatures continue to rise, you will see the flower stalks of the Balgas (Grass Tress) emerging in preparation for the coming Kambarang season.

Traditionally, the main food source at this time of the year included many of the land based grazing animals including Yongar (kangaroo), Waiitj (Emu) and the Koomal (possum).

We still get rain as we do in winter, but now the days get longer and the earth gets warmer to allow sleeping plants to wake up.

During traditional times, the Aboriginal people would still have lived more in-land during this season surviving on land based grazing animals similar to the winter season before of Makuru. These food sources included the Yongar (kangaroo), the Waitj (emu) and the Koomal (possum).

So for us and our members it is time to tend to our gardens go on our active walks and look on the brighter side of life.

### 2. REPORT ON THE JULY GUEST SPEAKERS: Yvonne Buter and Amina Shipp

At very short notice two passionate advocates for the Aged Care Reform spoke to the National Seniors on their personal experiences with aged care services and how they decided to become advocates. They belong to a 'non funding' and 'non-partisan' group.

The speakers work with advocacy groups and provide submissions on Aged Care and advocate for the Aged Care Act. They stated that all recommendations of the Royal Commission have a consequence. One issue is to examine closely where the appropriation of the money has been spent. The speakers took particular notice of complaints against abuse in aged care. Members generally felt they gave an excellent presentation.

## 3. REPORT ON THE CHRISTMAS IN JULY FUNCTION

It was a rainy wintry day to start of, but that did not dampen the spirit of those who attended the Christmas in July function at the Herdsman Tavern. Philip Goes played the guitar to Christmas carols and Chappie who has been holding the ship for the past two months announced the presentation of awards to a group of members and past members for their dedicated contributions. Amongst them Certificates of Acknowledgement were given to Adolph de Sousa who joined the NSA in 2016 and has since been the Vice-President and now Acting President. #### **VENTURE TO ROTTO FOR \$30.00**

The Seniors and Ageing Minister, Don Punch announced that Seniors with a WA Seniors Card can get a winter special travel concession to Rottnest Island for \$30 thereby saving seniors at least \$50.00. Bookings opened from Thursday 27 June for travel from 27 June through to Sunday August 18. *"Rottnest is one of our most iconic tourism destinations and we want more Western Australians to be able to access and enjoy our island paradise"* Tourism Minister Rita Saffiotti said.

#### NOMINATIONS FOR PERTH BRANCH COMMITTEE

### Federal Budget 24-25 - What is in it for You

With the release of the Federal 24/25 Budget, several policies have been announced. The extra investment will boost the areas of Aged Care, Medicare, and will make medicines cheaper. \$227 million was allocated to grow the number of Medicare Urgent Care Clinics to 87. This will allow for more patients to get urgent care from a doctor or nurse, while taking pressure off hospital emergency departments. Another \$882.2 million will be invested in partnership with the States to provide hospital outreach in the community, deliver virtual care to prevent hospitalisations, and upskill the residential aged care workforce.

With funding of over \$4 billion, the Government is helping deliver Cheaper Medicines for more Australians. The maximum co-payment of a PBS prescription medicine for pensioners will be frozen for 5 years. Medicines will stay cheaper, even in the case of inflation.

## **OTHER NEWS**

#### Federal Budget 24-25 - What is in it for You (continued)

In 2024-25, there will be 24,100 extra Home Care Packages available. This will help more Australians stay home and in their communities. On top of that, \$88.4 million will be invested in attracting and retaining aged care workforce, including to provide better staffing solutions.

Following the recommendations of the Independent Capability Review, the Government will invest \$111 million in enhancing the capability of the Aged Care Quality and Safety Commission.



This Government's main priority is to deliver responsible cost-of-living relief, without putting pressure on inflation. These measures will contribute to lower costs in healthcare and Aged Care and allow many more Australians to enjoy staying at home while receiving the attention they need.
