


National Seniors Brand Survey

Our Outing to Bendigo

The wonderful Leonie Taylor organised a group outing in early July, and some 25 members met at Southern Cross Station (still Spencer Street Station to many of us) to take the train to Bendigo to see the exhibition of portraits *"From Tudors to Windsors"* at the Bendigo Art Gallery. It's lucky that we didn't join a "Quiet Carriage" as the noise level of the chatter of the group quite drowned out the sounds of the train.

The exhibition comprised a large number of portraits on loan from the National Portrait Gallery in London, together with other material – armour, fashions, gloves, jewellery and even replicas of the crown jewels – on loan from Historic Royal Palaces, the Bath Fashion Museum, The Worshipful Company of Glovers of London, the Royal Armouries, the Museum of the Fashion Institute of Design at Los Angeles, the National Gallery of Victoria, the State Library of Victoria and the Art Gallery of South Australia. The portraits included images ranging from Henry VII in the late XV century to some current pictures of British royalty in the XXI century. And perhaps even more interesting, portraits of some of the prominent non-royal figures of the times.

The changes in portraiture over this period were quite marked, not only in technical prowess ("Look at the hands" they say), but also in the preferred styles of portraiture. And I wonder about mouths – is what we see today as the narrow, mean and spiteful mouth of Henry VIII a true reflection of his character, or simply the portraiture fashion of the times? Was a small mouth considered handsome in the early XVI century?

I wish there had been a portrait of the deplorable "Prinny" when as King George IV he made a visit to Scotland clad in kilt and pink stockings – but I suspect that even if there had been one, the National Portrait Gallery is keeping it well under wraps! Perhaps the old crime of lèse majesté is still on the books in Britain?

But there was one portrait which gained a great deal of attention from all – that of George Villiers, the first Duke of Buckingham, reputed lover/toyboy of James I.

This 1616 picture is a full-length representation of the of the 24-year old epicene duke, and one has to wonder whether the artist was emphasising the effeminacy of the man or did he really look like that. "I wish my legs were are nice as that" was a comment heard from a woman in the crowd!

Accompanying the pictures were some excellent charts with simple presentations of royal genealogies, showing who was who, and timelines relating the portraiture subjects to the wider historical events of their period.

After viewing the exhibition we were able to have lunch in the Gallery café; that in itself was an experience with the members of the group effectively taking over the cafe. We are all very grateful to Leonie for organising this trip.

The exhibition is now over, so if you want to see it you will have to travel overseas.

Today we mourn the passing of an old friend, Common Sense, who had been with us for many years. No one knows for sure how old he was, since his birth records were long ago lost in bureaucratic red

tape. He will be remembered as having cultivated such valuable lessons as:

Knowing when to come in out of the rain; Why the early bird gets the worm; Life isn't always fair; and Maybe it was my fault.

Common Sense lived by simple, sound financial policies (don't spend more than you can earn) and reliable strategies (adults, not children, are in charge).

His health began to deteriorate rapidly when well-intentioned but overbearing regulations were set in place. Reports of a 6-year-old boy charged with sexual harassment for kissing a classmate; teenagers suspended from school for using mouthwash after lunch; and a teacher fired for reprimanding an unruly student, only worsened his condition.

Common Sense lost ground when parents attacked teachers for doing the job that they themselves had failed to do in disciplining their unruly children.

It declined even further when schools were required to get parental consent to administer sun lotion or an aspirin to a student; but could not inform parents when a student became pregnant and wanted to have an abortion.

Common Sense lost the will to live as the churches became businesses; and criminals received better treatment than their victims.

Common Sense took a beating when you couldn't defend yourself from a burglar in your own home and the burglar could sue you for assault.

Common Sense finally gave up the will to live, after a woman failed to realise that a steaming cup of coffee was hot. She spilled a little in her lap, and was promptly awarded a huge settlement.

Common Sense was preceded in death by his parents, Truth and Trust; by his wife, Discretion; by his daughter, Responsibility; and by his son, Reason.

He is survived by his five stepchildren; - I Know My Rights; I Want It Now; Someone Else Is To Blame; I'm A Victim; Pay me for Doing Nothing.

Not many attended his funeral because so few realised he was gone.

Another Visit to the Synchrotron

Did you miss out on our visit to the Synchrotron? Phil Allen has organised another visit for us in November.

The Australian Synchrotron is a major research facility located in Clayton, a technology and innovation hub of southeast Melbourne. It is one of Australia's most significant pieces of scientific infrastructure. Opening in 2007 at its site in Clayton, Victoria, the Synchrotron is Australia's largest and arguably most successful scientific user facility, benefiting over 3000 researchers from academia, medical research institutes, governments, and other research organisations, and industry.

Our visit is timed for **14 November at 10.00am**, lasting 90 minutes. Attendees could have a coffee at Wheelers Hill Gallery or an early lunch at the Wheelers Hill hotel following the visit. The cost will be \$16.50 per person if there are 15 visitors participating. The minimum number is 12 and the maximum is 24.

Pre-registration is essential, and there will be a registration sheet at the AGM.


