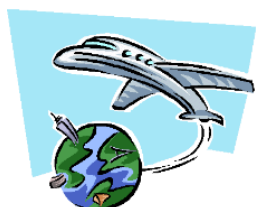

WASTE & CONTAMINATION

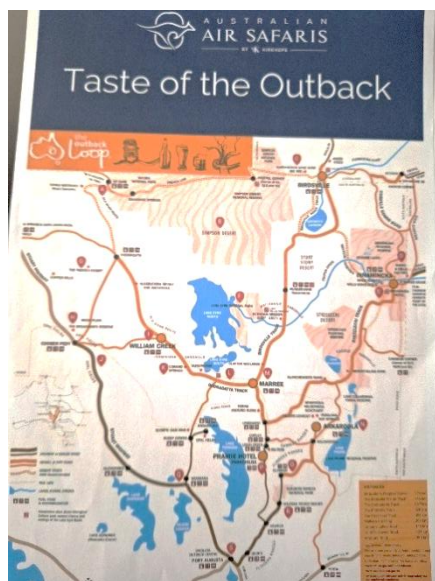
Our Guest Speaker Katherine the Waste Minimisation & Contamination Officer from Maroondah City Council was very interesting and helped us sort our waste plus tips to reduce and recycle.

Katherine has emailed the Branch some helpful resources which some Members were wanting to know where to buy particular items.

- Reusable Baking Mats (silicone mats) and reusable cupcake patties can be purchased at most shops that sell kitchenware including *Spotlight*, *Kmart* and *Big W*.
- Soaps, compostable cling wrap, reusables, and other more environmentally friendly products can be purchased online at *Biome - Eco Friendly*, *Natural*, *Vegan*, *Zero Waste Products Australia*. They also have a shop at *Burwood Brickworks Shopping Centre* near *Woolworths*.
- Reusable Incontinence Products. The products I had were from *In Care Support*. They have a showroom in Nunawading. (2-4 Burleigh Ct Nunawading Vic 3131. Open Monday-Friday 8:30am-4:30pm). You can call them on 1300 000 241, or visit their website - *Reusable/Washable – Incare Supports*

- If you wanted to shop without the packaging there is a shop in Maroondah called *The Full Pantry - Bulk Whole Foods Melbourne* - Organic Food Store, Online Store & Cafe. They are located at Shop 2+3, 66-68 Maroondah Hwy, Croydon. They also have a café attached to them.
- Here is a list of *Woolworth stores* that are taking soft plastic recycling - *Discover - Woolworths Online. 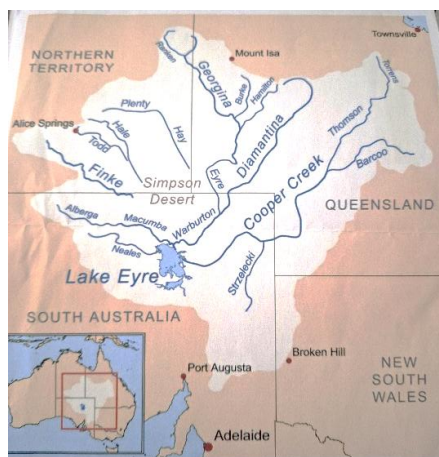
An item ticked off my bucket list – Lake Eyre in flood.



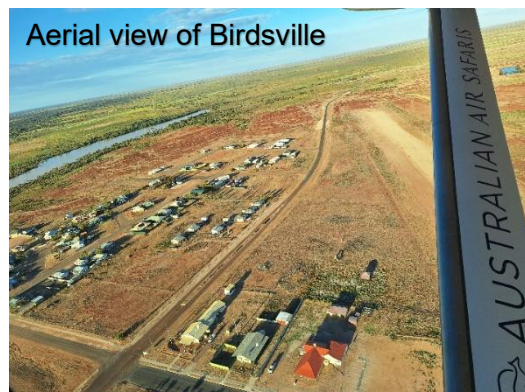
Lake Eyre has been somewhere I wanted to go and see when there were the big flows of water into it, like back in 1974 when the last big fill happened. This one is going to be similar or maybe surpass it. This means when the North and South parts actually join up which was evident when we flew over.

I was lucky to achieve this on 23 July 2025. I signed up for a 3-day tour – called the ‘*Taste of the Outback*’.

It was a light plane leaving from *Moorabbin Airport* around 7.30am in the morning; flying off over Victoria up to *Broken Hill* (New South Wales) for a refuel stop; then a short stop at *Innamincka* in South Australia's remote north east, for Lunch at the pub and a look around at the outback station that was a hospital but now the Information Centre.

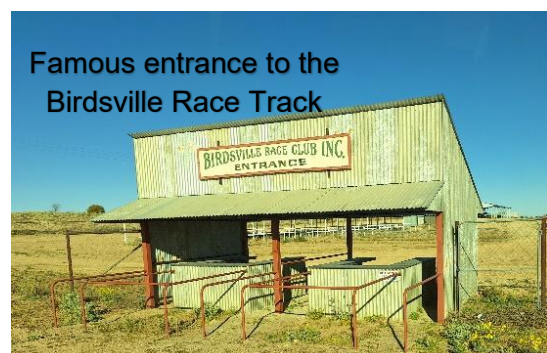


Boarded the plane flying over the changing countryside from dry to green from all the recent rains that flooded *Innamincka* and *Birdsville* – this has closed most roads in to and out of the area. The waters are slowly receding to allow some transport in. We flew over the *Coopers Creek* area to view the *Dig Tree* where the explorers Burke and Wills set up camp. The area was very wet at the moment not able to drive into to view up close.



across the road. A short break, then we went on a 4WD tour of *Birdsville*. We saw their water system of an underground thermal bore. It is so hot that it has to flow down channels to allow it to cool before use. There was a

Next stop was *Birdsville*, population around 110 people. The airstrip offers the best access to any hotel – directly when we went on a 4WD tour of *Birdsville*. underground thermal bore. It is so hot that allow it to cool before use. There was a viewing of the Birdsville Racecourse (all very green from the recent rains). We were told that they will have to strip all the green growth of the track before the races can be held – racing track rules and regulations. It is not a big town but the locals are really proud of what they have.

Our tour guide took us out to *Big Red*, a 40-metre-high sand dune. This is the first of 1,140 parallel sand dunes marking the edge of the Simpson Desert. We had drinks and nibbles to sit and watch the sunset. Back to Birdsville Hotel for dinner and chat with my fellow travellers.

Left Birdsville bright and early for our next leg of the tour – best day of the *Lake Eyre*. We flew over Bell Bay the deepest part of the *Lake Madigan Gulf*, the sand islands and *Warburton Inlet*. We flew low and slow over the vast spread of blue waters. We were all able to get some great shots of the Lake. Map above shows all the rivers and creeks that flow into *Lake Ayre*.

Muloorina Station Airstrip & Home

Landed at *Muloorina Station* for morning tea and lunch, which was provided by the owners of the station. This station was established in 1882. The current owners Cindy, Trevor and family have operated the station since 1938. The station is only 35 kms from the edge of *Lake Eyre* and this is where Donald Campbell and his '*Bluebird*' were based for the aborted 1963 attempt

and then successful 1964 breaking of the World Land Speed Record. A

Cindy showed us around the station. Also close to the homes of the family to where their bore water is left to cool for them to use, as this is their only water supply. Water tanks are not something useful out here due to lack of rain. They take in contractors that work on pipelines and roads to the mine not far away from them. This, the cattle they have on their property, plus the odd tour company, keep them going.



Flying over Flinders Ranges

After lunch it was back into the sky to *Leigh Creek* to refuel then a short flight over the *Flinders Ranges* to *Balcanoona* airstrip to house the plane overnight. We then took a 30-minute bus ride to *Arkaroola Wilderness Sanctuary* – the locals call it '*The Ark*', to our rooms for the night. We were able to have a relaxing drink and watch the yellow footed rock wallabies come down to a special area that they can feed. We took lots of pictures. They move very quickly and are really pretty with their really long tails full of stripes.

Dinner was a BBQ outdoors by the woodfires but the clouds were rolling in for the big weather forecasted and this meant we missed out on viewing the stars from the *Ningana Imaging Observatory*. Oh well, that is life. It was chilly but all had a good time. Went to bed to find the next morning the weather system was moving in and the rain and wind had

increased. There was supposed to be a 4-hour tour in an open air 4WD to *Siller's Lookout* so that you could view the ruggedness and beauty of the *Northern Flinders Ranges*.

It is home to over 160 species of birds and those yellow footed rock wallabies. We all decided to cancel on this due to the weather conditions and we left earlier to fly home to Melbourne to get ahead of the weather system due to arrive later in the day in Melbourne. We had heard that Adelaide had been bombed by 60mls of rain & very strong winds and more to come. The area we were at had only experienced light rain or shower or two so far this year, so the heavier rain was going to be welcomed for the area.



On our way back to the airport strip, we were noticing how quickly the road was holding water with a lot of water splashing onto the bus as we drove through. Our pilot had to prepare the plane for flight. We all sat on the bus in the warmth, whilst he did his preflight check – was a little soaked when he took off to our next refuel stop.

With the rain pelting the plane as we flew over the terrain below, our visibility was limited by cloud and rain. We flew to *Wentworth* to refuel. These fuel stops allow you to go the toilet and stretch your legs.

On one of the other fuel stops, one of the other passengers assisted our pilot in reading the figures as the pilot couldn't see it from the

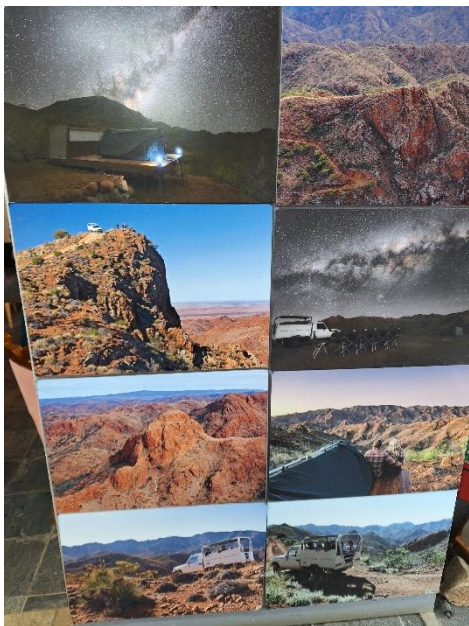
ladder on his side and he noted that each wing took \$800.00

worth of fuel, explains the cost of flying with this company (totally worth though). Bit wet getting in out at this last stop before home. We met some locals at the airport and they said that our plane was one of the first to utilise their new guidance system for cloud and inclement weather since it was recently installed. Normally it is clear skies as far as you can see.

We settled back with our lunch packs and journeyed home to Moorabbin Airport. We came in over the bay and it was interesting to see the Melbourne skyline from this side. Callam, our pilot, did a fantastic job of getting us there and back. Great memories for me to now have.

Australia New Driving Rules for Seniors Over 60 Starting August 2025

Australia, it seems, has the most recent amendments over driving laws for persons who are over 60, to be effective from August 2025. These give importance to road safety from older drivers and ensure the capacity of these drivers to stay on the road while being non-hazardous to society. It is vital for every person approaching or already over 60 to understand the changes.

Stronger medical assessments and procedures for renewal of licences form the major features of the new laws. More frequent tests may be required measuring vision and reaction time for these drivers over 60 to ascertain their fitness to drive. In some states, new forms of in-person driving assessments may be introduced when renewing licences. Emphasis is given to ensuring that the elder driver is competent to drive safely.

Effects on Senior Drivers

Henceforth, Australian seniors really need to pay a lot of attention to the new laws. Having regular medical check-ups, maintaining a healthy eyesight and adequate mobility, and knowing the new licensing procedures will be very important. These are not meant to curtail independence; instead, they are meant to ensure safety for seniors and the rest of the road users.

Licence Renewal and Medical Checks

Drivers above 60 have to undergo the new series of medical examinations when renewing their licence. A specialist clearance may become necessary in view of one's chronic health condition, reduced mobility, or sight. The renewal period may be further shortened, so the elderlies need to keep themselves aware of the expiry dates and documentation.

Support and Resources for Senior Drivers

Executive bodies and senior driver programs provide counselling to assist older drivers in adapting to the new rules. Educational materials are available, practice assessments can be taken, and advice is given on maintaining one's fitness to drive. Those who stay aware and remain proactive will aid seniors in living independently-but safely.

Conclusion

The new driving regulations for older Australians from the age of 60, to be put into place starting August 2025, aim to balance safe driving with independent living. An understanding of the regulations, the appropriate medical tests, and the use of available resources will keep the older drivers confidently on-road, and aided toward safer highways for the nation.

"Oh, that one is 72 million years and three months old." she replied.

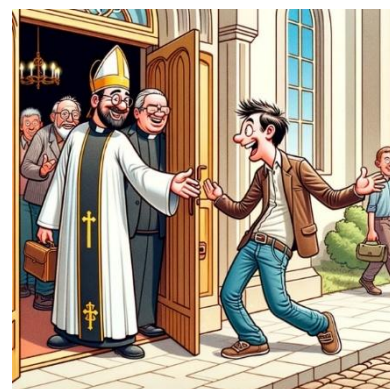
"Wow, how can you know that so precisely?" he inquired.

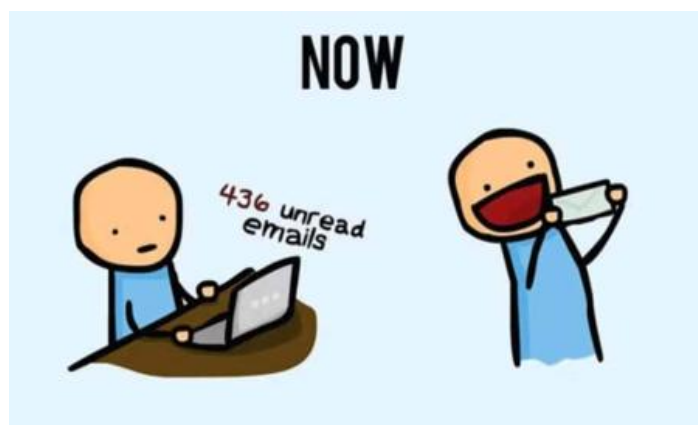
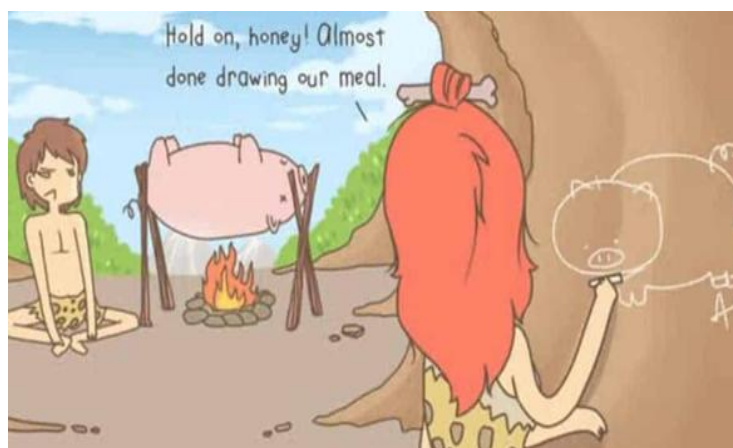
He took it and unfolded it. On the paper was written:

A medicine list is a complete list of all your prescriptions, over the counter and complementary medicines.

Now is the time to make sure you have that list up-to-date and easy to find in case you unexpectedly have to go to hospital or visit a doctor or pharmacist who is not familiar with your health status.



Please ensure you have this app installed on your phone – it could save lives and maybe even your own.

Emergencyplus is an app you can put on your mobile. (It was recommended by a trainer who trained the staff at my school.)

You can choose to load onto an Apple or Android system (2nd choice).

When loaded the right-hand screen will appear.



The **000 Emergency**, **SES** & **Police** are live buttons that will automatically call that service when pressed. Also, you will note your '*location coordinates*' appear so you can pass the information to the service concerned as to where your location is.

Senate inquiry into Home Care Package delays

You told us you want it fixed, and Canberra is listening.

National Seniors Australia's (NSA) ongoing [campaign](#) to cut wait times for Home Care Packages (HCP) through the delivery of more packages is resonating in Canberra.

Giving voice to our members and supporters around the nation, we're calling for the immediate release of additional packages, while the Federal Government restructures its multi-billion-dollar aged care system.

Access to home care, along with provider transparency, were two issues that received strong support in a recent survey of NSA members and supporters.

Releasing additional packages will help to reduce wait times and stem the number of older people forced into hospital or residential aged care while they wait for care.

The Senate crossbench has agreed to inquire into the home care delays after government rejected calls for the release of the additional packages.

NSA has welcomed the Senate inquiry, with our CEO, Chris Grice, saying while the delay to the new *Aged Care Act*, from 1 July to 1 November, was understandable to ensure the sector was ready, it shouldn't delay the release of new packages, which was set to begin on 1 July.

"The new Act acknowledges older people want to stay in their own homes for longer so they can remain healthy, active, and socially connected. It also acknowledges older Australians increasingly want the freedom, support, and choice to remain in the home and community they love," Mr Grice said.

A key advocate for the Senate inquiry, Senator David Pocock, said older Australians are suffering. "Australians are dying waiting to receive Home Care Packages and we're hearing report after report about bed block," he said on X. "The [crossbench] asked the government to bring forward 20,000 packages to help with the 87,000 backlog and the minister said no."

Elderly Australians are waiting up to 15 months for care they have already been deemed eligible for, and Mr Grice said helping older Australians age safely and independently in their homes is not possible without the urgent release of more HCPs.

"We need to remember when we're talking about packages, we're talking about people. Vulnerable people in desperate need of support at home; support to stay out of aged care; support to leave hospital; support to relieve family members who have become carers; and it wouldn't be a stretch to say support they need to survive."

Clearing the waiting list was a recommendation of the Aged Care Royal Commission, and one that NSA sees as a top priority for the Federal Government.

"We support the Senate inquiry and look forward to making a submission on behalf of every older Australian waiting for care, their families, and carers."

NSA – representing you in Canberra

NSA CEO, Chris Grice, Chair, Ross Glossop, and Deputy Chair, Marcia Griffin, were in Canberra this week for the first sittings of the new parliamentary term.

Over two days, NSA met with parliamentarians including Deputy Leader of the Opposition in the Senate, Shadow Minister for Health and Aged Care, and Shadow Minister for Disability and the NDIS, Senator Anne Ruston; Shadow Minister for Social Services, Senator Kerryanne Liddle; and Independent Member for Mayo, Rebekha Sharkie.

In addition to putting forward NSA's policy recommendation around Home Care, NSA also put forward policy recommendations to help ease cost-of-living pressures for older Australians and to help protect retirement income – key issues our NSA community has told us are important.

NSA appreciates the time all parliamentarians gave NSA and looks forward to continuing our work with all sides of politics to defend, protect, and promote the interests of older Australians.
