#### **BRANCH NEWS: TRIP TO THE THEATRE**

The Players' Theatre has put on its first major production since COVID shut it down last year and what a way to start over. Its production of "We Will Rock You" has taken three months of hard work by all involved. Judging by the audience reaction, it was a commitment of time and effort well spent.



Nineteen members met in the Gould Room upstairs in the theatre to enjoy drinks and nibbles, before joining the rest of the audience in the auditorium. Thank you to Judith C, Teresa I, Joan L and John U for the plates of delicious sandwiches, antipasto and desserts. It added a definite buzz to the evening to meet up in our own space before the curtain rose, and again during the interval.

The expectation of something enjoyable to come was heightened once we moved into the theatre itself. The house was full, and the audience of all ages was ready for some rock'n'roll.

The musical is set in a future world where overuse of the Internet has allowed the company Globalsoft and its leader, the Killer Queen, to take over. There is no live music, only a legend about something called Rock. A band of young rebels called the Bohemians are determined to unravel this mystery and gain "freedom, individuality, and the rebirth of the age of rock". Written by Ben Elton, the dialogue is quick and witty, typical of his sense of humour but it is really, at the end of the day, a vehicle for the music of QUEEN. That's what has drawn in audiences since its première in London back in 2002.

I imagine that it was the music that drew in this audience as well. Most of Queen's iconic songs are reprised to help move the story along: Radio Gaga, Crazy Little Thing, Killer Queen (of course), We Will Rock You, to name but a few. For those who remember the original releases, the performances helped recapture the spirit of the 70's and 80's. It was booming and energetic. For those a bit (or a lot) younger, it was perhaps a chance to move past some of the iconic hits such as "We Are the

Champions" to learn a little more about rock and roll.



At the interval, the Director, Hamish, joined our group to say hello and to find out what we thought about the show. He gave us some background details of the production and was full of praise for the commitment of our local artists. We each had our favourite performer and performance: some preferred the more melodic voice of the main female character, Scaramouche; others preferred the raunchier interpretation by the Killer Queen. All agreed these talented amateurs were doing an entertaining job.

Back from the interval, and building up to the finale, there was plenty of interaction between performers and audience. The actors often used the

auditorium as part of their stage, rushing in through doors and singing across the aisles. The audience has plenty of opportunity to get involved, keeping the beat and singing along.

The best was kept for last. The ensemble's curtain call was a full rendition of Bohemian Rhapsody which sent some of us of a certain age home with a smile, humming our favourite Queen song.

#### **WALKING IN WAUCHOPE**



When our walking group chose to walk along the river at Wauchope this month, we ended up taking a walk

through history, from the time of the First Nations right up to today. Residents of Wauchope will tell you that Port Macquarie is just an upstart in



comparison to this old timber and dairy town and the Hastings River was the lifeblood of the settlement.



Plaques telling a little of the river's economic and social story are strategically located along the walk, as are a number of weathered artworks. Our walkers spent more time reading these than rambling. Intrepid Judith also took the time to try her hand (and legs) at the few exercise stations along the way.

On a beautiful bright morning, it was difficult to imagine the river as it was in March. Signs of the devastation caused by the recent flood can be

seen all along the river but especially at Rocks Ferry Reserve. It is aweinspiring to think of the torrential speed the Hastings must have reached in order to do such damage. Logs/planks can still be seen at the edge of the railways bridge; the beautiful park is a scene of destruction with picnic tables and benches upended and footpaths



And the pathway swept aside

swept away. The fabulous waterpark is now a dry shambles.

However, this recent part of history didn't detract from the river's fascinating story or the beauties of nature on display. Nor did it spoil our enjoyment of the coffee after the walk was complete.

#### **LIFE'S FUNNY LITTLE MISHAPS**




### **BRIAN'S LATEST EPISODE** (By Wynn E)

#### HANDY HINTS AND HELPFUL

Some time ago, we asked our readers to send us handy tips that they have found useful. John B received this message last week from one of his tech sources and thought it might be of interest to everyone with a mobile phone or laptop i.e. quite a lot of us.

"You've heard you shouldn't charge your lithium-ion battery to 100%. But did you know you shouldn't go above 80%?

Lithium-ion batteries last the longest when they're at 30-80% charge. It's the charge going above 80% or below 30% that causes your battery to deteriorate faster over time.

That's right. Overcharging can happen before

you hit 100%. But if you know to try and keep your battery in this range (and only give a full charge if you need it for a long trip) you can keep your battery from deteriorating early.

So make sure you (and your friends) are in the know about how to keep their batteries in top condition."
