President's Report:

Welcome everyone to the New Year of 2020.

I hope everyone had a happy time over the Christmas and New Year period with friends and family.

While most of us in the west weren't affected greatly by the wild bush fires we must continue to think about those in the eastern states who have undergone the traumatic effects of bushfires. What a horrendous start to 2020 they have experienced and although rain is forecast, that in itself, brings other issues to contend with. We all hope that all of those in power will see this as the future of things to come if procedures and policies are not changed to address all of these issues that currently dominate world headlines.

The committee has many ideas for activities in the coming months.

Please be aware of the amount of planning and coordination that go into arranging dinners, lunches, outings and guest speakers and support these activities as much as you are able.

The following informative articles have come across my desk over the New Year period.

1 . PHARMACEUTICAL BENEFITS SCHEME

The Morrison Government has delivered on its election commitment, in lowering the threshold for the Pharmaceutical Benefits Scheme (PBS) Safety Net from 1 January 2020. This than means more 1.6 million concessional and general patients will get earlier access each year to free or significantly cheaper PBS medicines. The PBS Safety Net eases the financial burden on Australians who spend significant amounts on PBS medicines, such as people with chronic conditions. Once people reach the safety net threshold, they can apply to get free or discounted PBS medications for the remainder of the calendar year.

The safety net thresholds have been lowered from: \$390.00 to \$316.80 for concessional patients and

\$1550.70 to \$1486.80 for general patients.

The changes mean concessional patients will need to get 12 fewer PBS scripts filled in a year

in order to reach the PBS Safety Net, and two fewer scripts for general patients.

2. In an age of recycling and conservation the next **Earth Carer's Course** with Mindarie Regional Council commences on Tuesday 3 March 2020, with 5 sessions over 4 weeks.

The course includes site visits, tours, information sessions, practical hints and tips - all about Facing Your Waste. Household and industrial not human.

You will be inspired, overwhelmed, depressed and empowered often all at the same time!

There is a maximum of 40 places and preference is given to those who live or work in our member Councils of Wanneroo, Joondalup, Stirling, Vincent, Cambridge, Perth and Victoria Park.

AUSPOST CONCESSION

Did you know that you could get concession on postage stamps?

Are **YOU** eligible?

Pension card and Commonwealth Senior Health Card holders are eligible for concession postage.

It is currently @ 60 cents per stamp. Register at your nearest Post Office, by taking your appropriate card.

This takes only 5 minutes for them to register you.

You are then entitled to:

A free booklet of 5 concession stamps. This will be sent to you in the mail along with your MyPost Concession card

Take this card to the Post Office when you require more stamps.

Up to 50 concession stamps per year @ the current rate of 60 cents

A discount on Mail Hold and Mail Redirection services.

Writing the Date in 2020

Writing the date during the next year.

Most of us write the year using only the last 2 digits.

This year being 2020, writing just 20 leaves your document open to change. It allows anyone to change that date by adding 2 additional digits. Eg. 03 making it 2003, could render the document invalid, or, be acting fraudulently.

Legal documents such as Wills, Power of Attorney's could be adversely affected.

Be aware. We need to get into the habit of writing the year in full, always 2020.

Alzheimer's Analysis

Author: Professor Bruno Dubois

In the following analysis the French Professor Bruno Dubois Director of the Institute of Memory and Alzheimer's Disease (IMMA) at La Pipit-Salpêtrière - Paris Hospitals addresses the subject in a rather reassuring way:

"If anyone is aware of his memory problems, he does not have Alzheimer's."

1. I forget the names of families ...

2. I do not remember where I put some things ...

It often happens in people 60 years and older that they complain that they lack memory.

"The information is always in the brain, it is the "processor" that is lacking. "

This is "Anosognosia" or temporary forgetfulness.

Half of people 60 and older have some symptoms that are due to age rather than disease. The most common cases are:

- forgetting the name of a person,

- going to a room in the house and not remembering why we were going there

- a blank memory for a movie title or actor, an actress,

- a waste of time searching where we left our glasses or keys ...

After 60 years most people have such a difficulty, which indicates that it is not a disease but rather a characteristic due to the passage of years.

Many people are concerned about these oversights hence the importance of the following statement:

"Those who are conscious of being forgetful have no serious problem of memory. Those who suffer from a memory illness or Alzheimer's, are not aware of what is happening."

Professor Bruno Dubois, Director of IMMA, reassures the majority of people concerned about their oversights:

"The more we complain about memory loss, the less likely we are to suffer from memory sickness."
